A big part of our school is our fitness sessions. At least four days a week our tamariki have a session that benefits them aerobically; helps develop co-ordination, balance and strength. The most obvious to enhance the sense of well-being. Our Seniors get to use our fitness room, 'The Sweaty Sock' every second week. A typical session includes eight stations, with two minutes at each station, the last 30 seconds going hard out.

We do:

- -Rowing

- -Bikes
- -Boxing
- -Step work
