Sue retires from teaching at the end of the term. If Waipa School had National Treasures, Sue Sherson would be one of them. Her loyalty and commitment to all things Waipa has been without question.

Sue first came to Waipa in 1981 where she did a fixed term position teaching a Year 7 class for two years.

She then was transferred to other schools, as was the way then, for a further five years. She left teaching for a while to have her family, before returning to Waipa.

Sue has been a release teacher here for the last two and a half decades. This role included releasing teachers for blocks so they can work one to one with students etc, and releasing young teachers who get released a day a week so they can hone their craft, attend courses etc.

So, as you can imagine, this position required a vast array of skills, an abundance of talent and a myriad of qualities that are necessary to cope with so many different age levels. Patience and positivity being a priority.

We have been so fortunate to have Sue doing this role for such a long time. Her calm, kind and caring way with our tamariki endeared her to all, and she was determined to keep whatever class she was taking, engaged and striving to do their best.

I know her teaching colleagues had peace of mind when Sue was taking their class.

Her adaptability and initiative meant when they returned to their class, there were no pieces to pick up and it had been an enjoyable experience for all concerned.

Sue's flexibility to jump in at short notice, or to cope with sudden changes proved to be a major asset for us on so many occasions. All done with a smile on her face. We tried hard never to take that for granted.

Another of Sue's responsibilities was 'The Bookworm', our school library.

Along with Robyn Morgan, they made our library the envy of many schools.

I was always proud to show off our library to visitors. Jam packed with over six thousand books, computers, great furniture and great layout; it is a much-loved resource of our school.

Between them, Robyn and Sue ensured our library was open at lunchtimes, and many of our tamariki enjoyed the opportunity to play board games, do research, do some class work, or read and relax.

I don't know many schools where staff give up their lunch hour for the good of the children. On a personal note, I was indeed fortunate to enjoy Sue's quiet support and encouragement. My 'tough' day spirits were often lifted by a sincere world of positivity from her.

Sue's retirement from teaching will leave a gap, that will be hard to fill, and her love of 'Waipa' will be sorely missed.
